



Paul Nicholas Falkenhagen II

June 6, 1947 - December 30, 2016

Paul Nicholas Falkenhagen II, age 69, was born on June 6th, 1947 in Los Angeles to Hazel Cooley and Paul Falkenhagen, and passed away peacefully Friday, December 30th, 2016.

His father Paul, mother Hazel, and brother Garth all pre-seceded him in death.

He is survived by his devoted and loving wife of 32 years, Patricia; four children: John Nicholas Falkenhagen, Lisa Kimberly Falkenhagen Bivings, Julie Marie Bright; his step-mother Sue Falkenhagen; half-brother Scott Falkenhagen; half-sister Kim Doorly;. He also leaves behind nine grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

Paul was a Marine Corp Veteran of the Vietnam War, during which time he earned several medals. He served from September 29, 1967 – November 30, 1968, when he was wounded in battle, which led to him receiving the Purple Heart.

In 1975, he began his career working for the United States Forest Service. For thirty years, he passionately fought wildland fires. He started his career at Ft. Jones. Paul began as a smoke jumper and rose to Captain of his own crew.

Upon retirement Paul became avidly involved with the Yreka Rescue Ranch

where he served on the board.
